Dear Dr. Inglis:

My associates and I thank you for the opportunity to read your pre-print, "Similarities in the Side-Effects of ECT and Temporal Lobectomy in Man."

Your review of EEG studies, indicating an asymmetric EEG response to unilateral seizures, with accentuation of slow waves on the side of the application of electrodes is confirmed in our studies as well.

The remainder of your argument is good, and we can find little to criticize. Following your suggestion, we have recently attempted to induce seizures by frontal electrode application, and must report failures so far - the currents available are insufficient to induce a GM seizure. But we will persevere.

Again, our thanks for your report.
