Dear Mr. Peterson:

Your letter of October 22, makes me very sad indeed. In my prior discussions with you and Mrs. Grass I was told that the approximate delivery date was five months.

A formal order was sent on ^{August} ~~October~~ 20. Because of initial conditional requirements in the Department, I called Mrs. Grass and told her that this order was fully supported by me personally. As I told her in Denver, the conditional nature of this order has been removed. A formal note to this effect is now being processed by the College.

In moving from St. Louis to New York, I brought no equipment with me. I am anxious to get these projects started and have no other amplifiers to substitute. For this reason, delivery in late March will mean that productive studies will have been deferred for more than nine months. I can only request that to the extent that you can, that you attempt to adhere to the original time schedule. The Grass Instrument Company has always had my understanding and this letter represents the second time in our relationship that I have asked yours.
