Dear Al:

I am writing with regard to the collaboration you have proposed with Drs. Jus. I have reviewed the citations and articles available in my laboratory and find that they are principally of three kinds. The majority relate to studies of the EEG and EMG changes with conditioned motor reaction in psychotics and some normal subjects. References in this regard go back about twelve years.

There are two reports, one of which is in 1965, describing the EEG changes in childhood schizophrenics with an emphasis on the treatment with amphetamine. Finally, I have citations for two reports regarding the effect of nialamide and Majepil on EEG and behavior of psychotic subjects.

Of these three subjects, the changes induced by psychotropic drugs on EEG and behavior is probably the area of most common interest, although I believe that their contribution has been small in this regard. If they are interested in such a common subject, then this is most easily done.

I believe that their greatest interest is in conditioning studies. Unfortunately, I have done <sup>most</sup> of these, and if this became a principal focus, I believe that Roy would have to be involved since he has done such studies.

Their third area of interest, that of EEG changes in schizophrenic children, is another subject in which we both have been interested and could be established if we had a population of adolescent schizophrenics available for study.

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
