Dear Dr. Harmony,

Thank you for your interesting reprints and the question regarding the citation in the CEAN volume. I note from your papers that E. Roy John has been one of your preceptors. In the CEAN discussion, I was citing the many advances in this country in the development of special computers for diagnosis (the work of Harner, for example); the use of averaged evoked potentials for the identification of brain damage (here the work of John is a fine example); and the use of cross correlators (the work of John is still the best example). In the latter reference I was also interested in the studies by Leonide Goldstein. There are surely others but they do not come to mind readily, although I recall similar interests by the school at the UCLA Brain Research Institute (Adetyand his co-workers).

My work is far from the basic neurological studies reflected in your studies. We emphasize the application of the EEG to the definition of drug effects-- a good example is the paper in the CEAN and that of my former co-worker, T. Itil. If you have some question regarding that study, please write again.
