Dear Don:

Everything is possible and I believe that much of the work can be done either at the University or even at our own laboratories if the analyses are small. The problem is not one of whether, but by whom. There is little problem in obtaining computer time or in carrying out the actual running of the analysis. The major time consumed is in the preparation for an analysis and I dare say this is the biggest bottleneck in the analyses that you may need.

However, I will do the best I can. The Hillside material has been transferred from cards to a set of tapes which are now at the University. I will have these run off and send you a copy. The various items will be coded according to our problem numbers and there should be no problem in identifying the various pages. However, as soon as I have such a copy I will make what notations I can and then send these to you. For any of the items or all of them, you can have a duplicate tape or a duplicate set of cards, if you wish.

My new found leisure time has overwhelmed me with the desire to complete many projects, including the recent submission of the tri-hospital study which has been accepted by the *Archives of General Psychiatry* and for which both Bob and Nat are thankful.
