Dear Dr. Beaubrun:

Since returning to New York, I have had the occasion to report our discussions to my associates and to NIMH.

Should you wish it, I believe another study is feasible and can probably be supported. We can prepare the study design, and provide the necessary staff and equipment to assist your personnel. The timetable of January-April 1972 is feasible here, and may be supported if we provide the necessary data by early August.

For its success, the project will require your recommendation of two staff members - a registrar-psychiatrist and a project coordinator. The registrar should receive some training with us, and be responsible for the medical-psychiatric aspects of each experimental session. If he were available now, it may be useful to have him participate in the actual proposal-writing. The project coordinator should be capable of identifying the subjects and arranging for their availability for study. Such a person, if named now, could also participate in the write-up.

I would like to recommend the active participation of Drs. Ward and Stuart in this phase of the study.

I believe there should be two proposals - a short-term study of the physiological (EEG, cardiovascular, respiratory) effects of Jamaican ganja, NIMH marijuana, and THC-free cannabis; and a long term study of the Jamaican population, to continue to define the psychological, medical, and biological effects of chronic ganja use. Both proposals may be funded through a U.S. non-profit agency should you concur.

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
