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Dear Andy,

I am pleased to tell you that after a number of revisions, the data of the trifluoperidol study has been accepted by *The Journal of New Drugs* and should be in the public domain within a few months.

The remainder of the program is going along well. The CDT project is now completed and we are actively analyzing the rating scales using the programs developed in the trifluoperidol study. Dr. Itil and I have been encouraged to write another report on trifluoperidol and its EEG patterns, and this is now in its fifth draft.

I do not know if you have undertaken some new drug studies. During the past two months, I have had the opportunity to teach the medical students at Renard Hospital. I was surprised and pleased to see so many acutely ill patients. It became obvious that the population problems that we faced last year were artificial and were related to the peculiar social structure of the Institute and the community in which it finds itself. As you may have known, I had been invited some months ago to participate in the training programs at the New York Medical College. There too, I saw many acutely ill patients and when I was invited to join their staff on a full time basis, I have decided to do so. So, with the programs here in full swing, Martha and I and the children will be returning to New York in June. I hope that Turan will be able to maintain the program and I look forward to continuing my collaboration with him.

By now, you should have been a father and surely you have pictures which you would like to send to some of your friends here in the states. The girls miss Betty and Linda, especially, is delighted (and we for her) that she will be able to attend dancing school next fall.
