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Dear Jim:

Many things have happened these past four months since I last wrote, and I am writing now to tell you that I look forward to visiting with you in London. My plans are to arrive in London early Wednesday, August 26, from Paris, George Ulett will be arriving in London that night and unfortunately, we both have reservations to go to Newcastle to visit Martin Roth Thursday evening, August 27. I plan to be back in London the 29th and 30th, before going on to Birmingham.

I would be delighted to spend Wednesday afternoon and Thursday morning with you, and will accept your hospitality for Wednesday evening if Sheila is willing to care for a "bachelor" for that evening.

Unless our present plans change very much, we are victims of the peculiar air traffic schedules which provide special rates for twenty-one day trips. For months, Martha and I have resented this, and have tried to find an alternate for her to spend a longer period in Europe so that she could include a visit to London in this trip. However, because Jonathan is going with us and because all of us wanted to visit Israel this year, we are going to leave New York on the 4th, and plan to spend ten days or longer in that country. For this reason (unless I can find an additional \$300 between now and then), Martha will be leaving the Continent on August 26. George and his wife are involved in the same cartel squeeze, so that he will be alone in England from the 27th on.

Since you last wrote, Andy Don and Betty joined our staff. He is a delightful young man, energetic and bright, and inexperienced. Your evaluation was exactly right, and I am glad he joined our staff, because he is working very well with me and with Turan.
