It was a pleasure to receive your letter, even though there is a misinterpretation regarding our research programs. The report which you read must have had an error, because we have not been studying hand steadiness in our recent research. Some years ago, when we studied the effects of Thlorazin and imipramine on various psysiological tests, hand steadiness was one pattern that was investigated. That work was completed, and is not continued here. It is possible that Max Pollack at Hillside is continuing some similar studies and if you are interested, I would suggest you contact him.

The laboratories here have grown very rapidly and I am most excited by a wide range of studies which are now in progress. For the past year and a half I have been predominately an administrator and only recently have I had the luxury of going back to my studies.

I have been able to keep in touch with our friends in the East through the newsletter, and am sorry that I have missed the politics of the last few months.
