Dear Stanley:

Thank you very much for the review of the TTR data which we sent to you. It is indeed helpful, and we have decided to review the EEG changes which accompanied these analyses in an effort to consolidate the kind of report which he might be able to give this Fall.

Like all complex projects, we are now having some problems with our project design. The recordings seem to be quite clear and, as of yesterday, both microphones were installed overhead. The first recording with the new microphone positions will be done on Tuesday, and that should be as good as we can record in our present environment. I will send that tape to Lou for review. Actually, our problems are not with linguistic analysis, but with our EEG program. Our analysis is quite sensitive, and we suddenly observe that in doing a continuous analysis, there are extensive periods of abnormal movement on the part of the patient, giving us many artefact full records. However, we believe that by sampling rather than doing a continuous analysis we will solve this problem.

I hope to be in New York during the next few weeks, and will take the liberty of calling you at that time. I have not yet arranged to send a girl to you because we have not yet structured the tape analysis satisfactorily, and I would rather defer the training period until I have collected two or three tapes which she can bring with her to work in your setting.
