Dear Phillip:

I have devoted the past two days to reviewing the manuscripts available to me, and in preparing a summary of our proceedings. The manuscripts and my notes are going out separately today. There is one special question which is related to the two documents of invited participants, Drs. Ilyuchenok and Jenkner, which were not presented at the meeting.

I have found that Dr. Ilyuchenok's manuscript is quite good and would commend its inclusion in the proceedings.

With regard to Dr. Jenkner, I am puzzled. I have available a four page abstract, a copy of which is enclosed. Though I believe that some of the material would be quite relevant to the discussion, and, as it deals with a peculiar state of altered consciousness, I believe it may be considered for inclusion. However, I do not have the full manuscript, and this would have to be solicited. It would be a delicate matter to solicit the manuscript and then decide as to its suitability. I am therefore sending the abstract to you and would suggest that we do write to Dr. Jenkner asking for the full manuscript, perhaps providing some caution that it should be submitted for consideration for publication. If you concur, please write directly to him, or I will be glad to do so.

In the manuscript which I have just read, I am making neither editorial changes nor correction of style, since the specific guidelines for this volume are not available to me. I would be glad, however, to make such editorial and typographical suggestions if we can agree on the necessary style guideline.
