Dear Dr. Jenkner:

Dr. Bradley and I are pleased to confirm the invitation for your participation in the symposium on Anticholinergic Hallucinogens at the forthcoming meeting of the CINP to be held in Washington, D.C. on March 29 and 31. We look forward to the presentation entitled "Disturbances of Consciousness and the Application of Anticholinergic Compounds." As there are still a few questions about the ability of some of the European invitees to attend the meeting, it will be a few weeks before we can send a definitive program and time schedule.

Even at this late date the committees of the CINP are unsure as to the availability of support for the invited participants. Dr. Bradley and I have recommended some financial assistance for your participation in this symposium. We have been told that the distribution of funds may lie with Dr. P. Deniker (Hopital Ste. Anne, 1 rue Cabanis, Paris 14^e, France). Dr. Bradley and I have written to him and we would suggest that you write directly upon receipt of this letter.

The CINP is an international fellowship society dedicated to research in psychopharmacology. The letters stand for Collegium Internationale Neuro-Psychopharmacologicum. The society was organized at the time when the World Congress of Psychiatry met in Zurich in 1957.

Five reports will be presented during each three hour session, allowing thirty-five minutes for each presentation and discussion. Since the discussion may be of special interest to the participants, the report should be about 20 minutes in length.

The CINP has permitted us to consider the publication of this symposium separately. Insofar as this subject is becoming increasingly important, we believe that the association of the work of the participants in a single volume will be a valuable contribution, and ask your cooperation in making a manuscript available at the time of the meeting. The manuscript should be approximately 20 pages of text, plus bibliography and illustrations.
