Thank you for your reprint, "Shock, Surgery and Cerebral Asymmetry" which I read with interest, and enthusiasm except for your insensitivity in continuing to use the barbaric non-descriptive term of "shock".

My associates have treated a few patients with multiple induced convulsions using frontal electrode placements. While induction is more difficult, it is practical, however, and the results comparable to bitemporal and unilateral placements. We are now studying the memory, clinical and EEG effects in a systematic way.
