Dear Philip:

I have carried out most of the instructions of your letter of November 4. Invitations have gone to the list of names which are attached, and I am sending you your invitation as a xerox copy of the letter to one of the other invitees. Please accept this as a suggestion for you to write a title and a few sentence abstract for our use in the next few weeks.

I believe we should plan a one day symposium as a minimum, and a day and a half as a maximum. Much will depend on the response to our invitations.

Of the names in the first group, invitations have gone to all except Nakajima, and I am awaiting further information from you. In sending the invitations to the invitees in the Iron Curtain countries, I did not understand the suggestion of two letters. I believe the invitation as framed has both a formal and personal aspect. If this does not seem satisfactory, please advise me and either you or I can send a second invitation.

While I read your footnote about a charter flight, I am still an optimist and if enough new names are sent to you, perhaps a group rate can still be organized. For this reason, I included the sentence at the bottom of page one of the invitation.

The note regarding Miss Taylor was added in response to the notices from the Planning Committee.

I have an opportunity to meet with Jonathan Cole later this week and will approach the subject of translation, discuss the invitations and the present status of our program so that he will be acquainted with our progress. However, if it will be more helpful for you to notify the Executive Committee, would you do so in a more formal fashion.

As soon as I have any responses, I will write to you.
