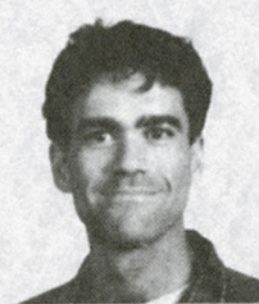

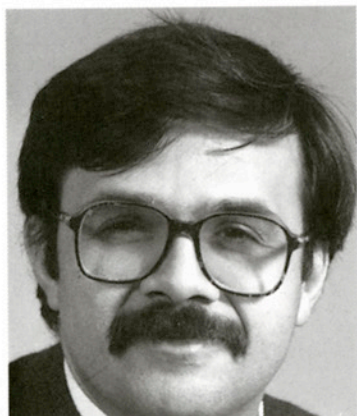
Dear Class of 1999,

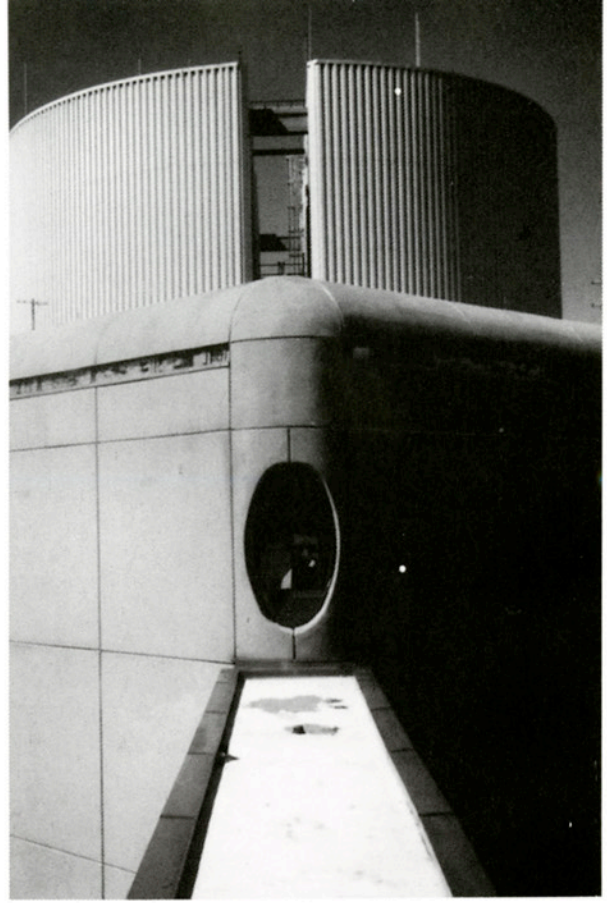
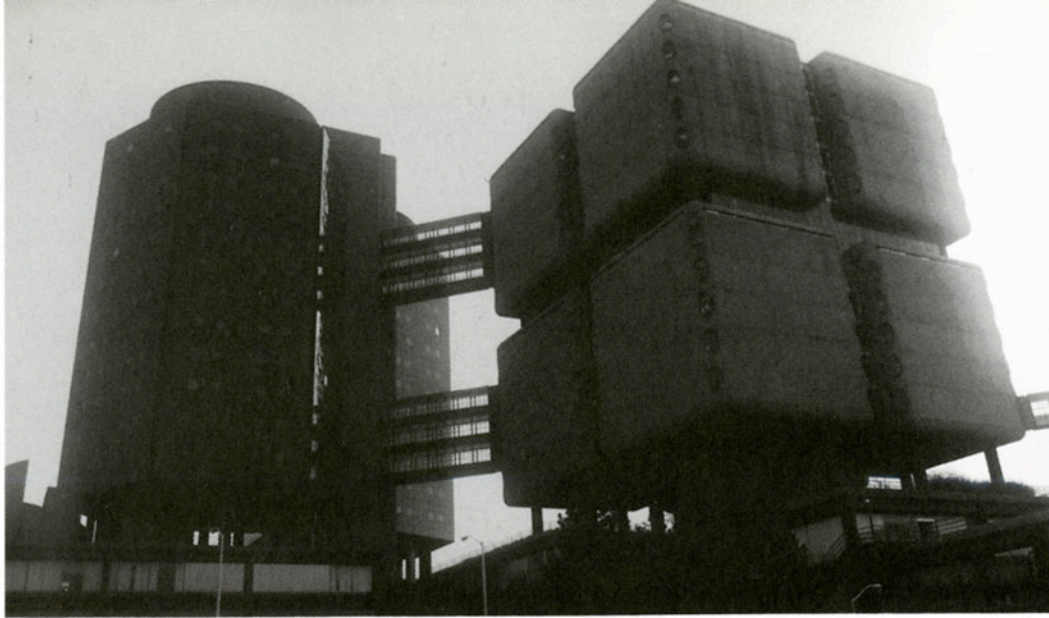
To the Class of 1999

flourishing.

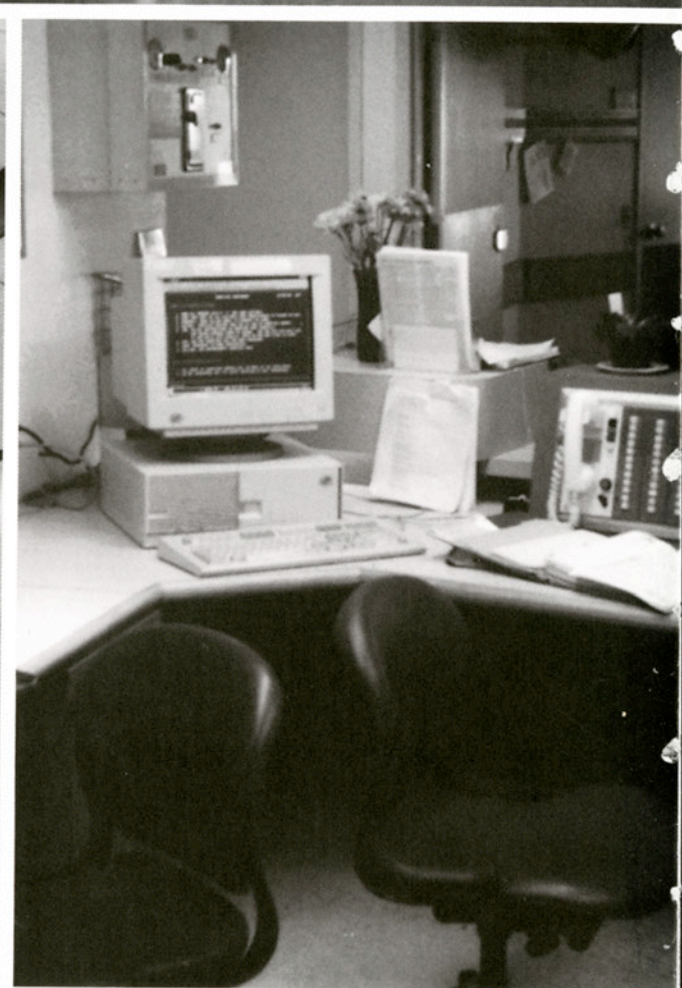
