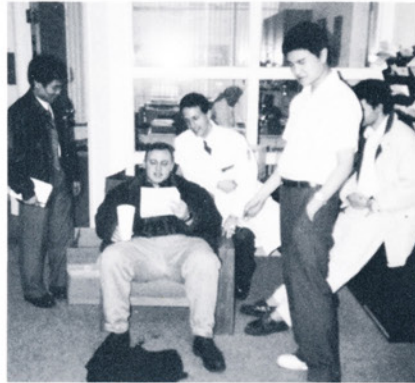
To the Class of '96 (Varied but Solid):

Good spirit, good effort, good future. To all of you I wish the best of everything.



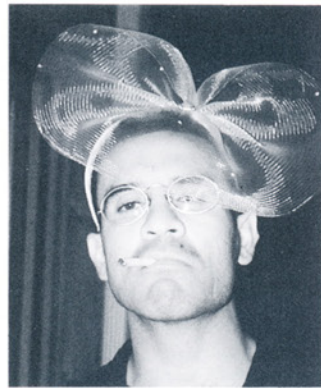
